Perceptions of safety

When out and about in Stonnington, most people feel moderately (55%) or very safe (32.7%).



of residents **feel safe** walking alone during the day.

- » Entertainment precincts/nightlife areas, laneways, residential streets, travelling on public transport and bike/shared pathways are places where more people report feeling unsafe.
- » Seeing or experiencing people speeding in cars, litter/rubbish, alcohol/drug debris, graffiti and noisy/rowdy/inconsiderate behaviour in the street contributes most to people feeling unsafe.
- Just over two thirds (69.1%) of residents agreed that people in their neighbourhood are willing to help each other.

Injury and Hospital Admissions



residents feel safe walking alone in their **local area after dark.**

- » Just over half (50.9%) of residents felt that they live in a close-knit neighbourhood, significantly less than the Victorian estimate (61.0%).
- » 57.5% feel their could 'raise' attention from people who live here, if they sensed trouble.
- » Almost three quarters of residents (74.1%) agree that people in their neighbourhood can be trusted.
- » One in five (21.4%) residents volunteer for an organisation or group.

1855 unintentional injury hospitalisations in 2018

- The largest age group for unintentional injury hospitalisation was 25-64 years followed by 65-84 and the 85+.
- Falls was the main cause of injury followed by transport with fractures the most common injury type.



- » Hospital admissions for falls is higher for Stonnington in both males and females in comparison to Greater Melbourne and Victoria. Admissions for females are significantly higher than males.
- » Most injuries occurred in the home followed by roads, streets and highways, residential institutions and sports and athletic areas.



Crime

There were 9494 criminal incidents in 2020, an 8.4% increase from 2019. Public health and safety offences related to COVID restrictions caused the biggest increase.

- » In 2020, South Yarra, Prahran and Malvern East experienced the most crime followed by Windsor.
- » Theft from a motor vehicle remains the main crime committed.

People aged 25–34 years experience the most harm and males experience more harm than females. For the last five years, Stonnington has had a higher rate of victimisation than the Victorian average.

» 74% of all crime in Stonnington was categorised as low harm crime, 15.3% was considered medium harm crime and 10.7% was considered high harm crime.

» Sexual offences against children has halved in the last two years in Stonnington.
