Sneaky Little Revolutions: selected essays of Charmian Clift

"I know it's a daring suggestion, but I'll make it anyway."

In 1964, Charmian Clift returned to Sydney, with husband George Johnston, after years in the cosmopolitan community of Hydra (Greece) – and discovered that her progressive opinions were rare in 1960s Australia.

In these 'sneaky little revolutions', as Clift once called her essays, she supported rights for women and migrants, social justice for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people, opposed conscription to Vietnam, fought censorship — and set a new benchmark in Australian literature.

Editor and biographer **Nadia Wheatley** discusses the life, myth and work of Charmian Clift with host **Claire Halliday**.

If you could make the soundtrack to your life, a mixtape, what songs would you choose?


Almost a Mirror is an edgy mashup of live music and storytelling, based on Kirsten Krauth's popular and critically acclaimed novel and podcast series of the same name.

Press play on Side A and take a journey through music from the late 70s/80s — where the post-punk world of St Kilda's Crystal Ballroom collides with the pop icons of Countdown.

Join **Kirsten Krauth** and extraordinary ensemble on this deep dive into the iconic songs of the era, veering from Planet Earth to Wide Open Road, from Shivers to Barbados — from the elegantly wasted to the neon lights.

The show is a collaboration with some of Australia's top musicians including Sarah Bedak (Lolo Lovina), Paul Haigh, Charles Jenkins, Fiona Lee Maynard (Dalicados), Joshua Gitsham and Michael Simic (Mikelangelo).







The Uncaged Sky

Kylie Moore-Gilbert speaks to **Belinda Hawkins** about **The Uncaged Sky**, her fight to survive 804 days imprisoned in Iran, the complex game of global politics and what it means to be free.

In 2018, British-Australian academic **Kylie Moore-Gilbert** was arrested by Iran's feared Islamic Revolutionary Guards and sentenced to ten years in prison for espionage.

Incarcerated in Tehran's Evin and Qarchak prisons for 804 days and subjected to relentless interrogation, Kylie was pushed to the limits of her endurance by extreme physical and psychological deprivation.

After more than two years of struggle, Kylie was released in 2020 in a high stakes three-nation prisoner swap deal orchestrated by the Australian government. This is her story.

The abuse in our homes

Women are nearly three times more likely than men to experience violence by a current or former partner, and one woman is killed nearly every week in Australia due to family violence.

In the lead-up to the 16 Days of Activism against Gender-Based Violence campaign, **Nicole Lee**, family violence survivor and public advocate for the prevention of family violence, together with cross-cultural consultant **Tasneem Chopra OAM** and writer **Bri Lee**, discuss gender based and domestic violence, how far we've come and how far we've got to go to confront the crisis of abuse in our homes.





Clementine Ford is a person who has loved deeply, stangely, and with curiosity. She is fascinated by love and how it makes its home in our hearts, believing that the way we continue to surrender ourselves to love is an act of great faith and bravery. How we Love is Clementine's tender and lyrical memoir that explores love in its many forms, through her own experiences.

In early 2019, **Rick Morton** was diagnosed with complex post-traumatic stress disorder – which, as he says, is just a fancy way of saying that one of the people who should

have loved him the most during childhood didn't. My Year of Living Vulnerably charts Rick's journey to betterness (not cured, not fixed, just better) and his rediscovery of love. What love is, how we see it, what forms it takes, how we practice it in our lives, what it means to us, and how we really can't live without it, even if, like Rick for many years, we think we can.

Writing your novel, memoir or biography, with Graeme Simsion

Bestselling author **Graeme Simsion** shares his process and techniques to writing a novel, memoir or biography.

This lecture will cover the end-toend process of writing, from premise to proofreading, as described in Graeme's book The Novel Project: A step-by-step guide to writing your novel, memoir or biography.

Participants will learn:

- how to plan the writing process
- how to take control of their creativity
- how to create credible, complex characters

- how to structure their novel using proven storytelling principles
- how to deal with crises and problems, including writer's block and.
- how to work with beta readers and editors.

Note: this session will be delivered in a lecture-style set up, participants will not have desks, and no writing exercises will be undertaken or workshopped on the day. Questions and discussion will, however, be encouraged.

While there has been unprecedented trans visibility in Australia in the last decade, this visibility has not always been positive, shadowed by transphobic misinformation and extremist rhetoric.




